


INTRODUCTION TO OUR CITY



San Diego is California’s second-largest city, just after Los Angeles, and is the eighth largest city in the United States. The metropolitan region includes San Diego, Chula Vista, and Carlsbad. The County encompasses 18 incorporated cities and numerous other charming neighborhoods.

San Diego is known for its beaches, parks, and warm climate, making it a tranquil home for its residents. The scenery is unmatched, with its beautiful ocean views and picturesque landscape. This provides a plethora of outdoor activities for the city’s residents, such as biking and hiking on scenic trails, along with water activities such as surfing, kayaking, and snorkeling. There are also many areas for residents to eat, shop and explore, such as the Gaslamp Quarter and Little Italy in downtown San Diego. Family-friendly activities include catching a Padres baseball game or visiting the famous San Diego Zoo. San Diego is also home to the largest active naval base on the west coast. It is home to 54 ships, 13 piers, and 20,000 military personnel. From residents to tourists - the diverse city has something for everyone.




POPULATION

San Diego is the seat of San Diego County, which has a population of nearly 3.3 million.[16] It is known for its mild year-round Mediterranean climate, extensive beaches and parks, long association with the United States Navy. The projected population of San Diego County in 2025 is 3,298,799. This is a slight increase from the 2024 population of 3,298,799. The population of the city of San Diego is projected to be around 1.54 million in 2020, 1.69 million in 2030, 1.82 million in 2040, and 1.95 million in 2050.

CLIMATE


One of the main perks of San Diego is the weather. The San Diego climate is often described as Mediterranean, with its hot, dry summers and cool, wet winters.

On average, 344 days of the year are hotter than 60° F, with only 25 days are hotter than 80° F. On average, 146 days are sunny while 117 days are cloudy out of the year. Due to San Diego’s marine layer, summer skies often have clouds and fog in the morning. These marine layer clouds linger until the sun is strong enough to evaporate the clouds. These months are often referred to as “May Gray” and “June Gloom.” Even with a few gray summer mornings, the Pleasant Weather Rating Service Poll voted San Diego as the best year-round weather in the nation and the second best in the world.

HISTORY OF SAN DIEGO

San Diego is called the “Birthplace of California” since it is the home of the first permanent Spanish settlement in California. The Spanish settlers came in 1769 and established the first mission that was the beginning of California’s colonization. San Diego officially became part of the United States in 1848, and California gained statehood in 1850.


Beginning in the 1920s and 30s, San Diego began to grow its placement as a military and defense center for the west coast. Following World War II, the city continued to attract newcomers based on its geography and climate and in the 1950s the population doubled.



San Diegans can enjoy the city and all it entails, in a way that tourists are not able to. There are more than 90 museums, 340 parks, and 25 miles of shoreline that make up the San Diego metro area.

The San Diego is also family-friendly. Education is a high priority and there are many highly rated schools in the area. The school district consists of almost 100,000 students in its K-12 program. For higher education, there are over 20 universities and colleges. San Diego’s crime rate is 15% lower than the national average and is one of the safest large cities in the country.





Overall: The total of all the cost-of-living categories weighted subjectively as follows: housing (30%), food and groceries (15%), transportation (10%), healthcare (7%), utilities (6%), and miscellaneous expenses such as clothing, services, and entertainment (32%). State and local taxes are not included in any category.

Grocery: The cost of groceries compared to the US average of 100.

Health: The average cost of health care calculated using the standard daily rate for a hospital room, and the costs of a doctor’s office visit and a dental checkup.

Housing: The median cost of an area’s average home, for both buying and renting. Does not include property taxes or utilities.


Median Home Cost: This is the value of the year’s most recent home sales data. Please note that this is not the average, but the median, which is the middle value when you arrange all sales prices of homes from lowest to highest.

Utilities: The average cost of heating or cooling a typical residence for the area, including electricity, natural gas, and other fuels.

Transportation: The average cost of gasoline, car insurance, maintenance expenses, and mass transit fare for the area. The cost of the vehicle and any vehicle registration.

Miscellaneous: The cost index of those goods and services not included in the other cost of living categories, including clothing, restaurants, repairs, entertainment, and other services.


TAXES

State Income Tax: California imposes a graduated income tax similar to the Federal Income Tax in structure. Returns are due April 15.

California Property Tax: Taxes are calculated at approximately 1.25% of the value or purchase price of a property plus any voter-approved tax additions for the community.

Retail Sales Tax: For San Diego County, there is a tax rate of 7.75% with the exception of Vista (8.25%), El Cajon (8.25%), La Mesa (8.5%), and National City (8.75%). This is added to all tangible personal property, apart from groceries, prescribed medicine, and newspapers.

Tax Year: The tax year is July 1 through June 30. Taxes are paid in two equal installments. On November 1, the first installment is due and includes a 10% penalty if not paid by December 10. The second installment of the real property tax is due on February 1 and becomes delinquent if not paid by April 10. If the second payment is delinquent, handling costs are added as well as the 10% penalty.



RELOCATION TO SAN DIEGO

San Diego has been coined Most Inventive City in the World and Best Place to Launch a Startup by Forbes and continues to be a great place for both businesses and employers. The backbone of San Diego's economy is international trade, manufacturing, military, and tourism. The top employers in San Diego are the US Navy; the University of California; Sharp Healthcare; Qualcomm; and the San Diego School districts. The unemployment rate in San Diego is 3.2% compared to 3.7% nationwide.

In San Diego County, businesses have access to world-class research and innovation, top-ranked colleges and universities, business communities, a diversified economy, and high intellectual capital. More than 100 languages are spoken by San Diego residents and the county has a diverse population of residents who have moved here from all over the world.


The City of San Diego ensures that the climate for business is inviting. The city implements good government practices toward businesses while creating specific economic development programs. The city also maintains a healthy and safe environment and an up-to-date, well-maintained infrastructure that makes San Diego business-friendly and a great place to live.

Employment Cards/Certifications

All food handlers are required by San Diego County Code to possess either a valid food handler card issued by a county-authorized food handler training school or a County of San Diego food handler test administered by the current food safety manager who has passed a state-approved food safety certification exam.

The California Department of Social Services (CDSS) regulates in-home daycare, which it refers to as Family Child Care Homes, in San Diego. Licensure is required when you provide care and supervision to non-relative children from more than one family.



The San Diego Unified School District (SDUSD) has always placed a strong emphasis on providing its students with a great education. The current enrollment in SDUSD exceeds 97,000 and consists of 176 schools - 113 elementary schools, 24 middle schools, 4 atypical schools, 10 alternative schools, 27 high schools and 25 charter schools.

SDUSD services the following zip codes in their entirety: 92037, 92093, 92101, 92102, 92103, 92104, 92105, 92106, 92107, 92108, 92109, 92110, 92111, 92113, 92116, 92117, 92119, 92120, 92122, 92123, 92126, 92134, 92139, 92140, 92161, and 92182. This covers the Mira Mesa and Scripps Ranch neighborhoods; east to San Carlos and Lake Murray neighborhoods; south to Bay Terraces, Paradise Hills and Logan Heights neighborhoods, and the coastal neighborhoods from Point Loma to La Jolla.


California compulsory education law requires everyone between the ages of six and eighteen years of age to attend school. School is mandatory for six-year-old students, but if a child is five years old on or before September 1 they can be admitted to kindergarten.

From kindergarten to college, picking the right school can be a big decision. Here are some valuable tips and information that apply to parents and students.

ENROLLMENT

Children must be five years old on or before September 1st to enroll in kindergarten in SDUSD. When enrolling your child in school, you must have current verification of residency, which can include items such as utility bill, rental agreement, mortgage document, or military housing orders up to 6 months in advance; the child's official identification records (birth certificate, baptismal certificate, or passport), and current immunization records.

If your child is a student who has already been attending a school in SDUSD and has been newly accepted to a new school or you have recently moved into a new neighborhood, you may enroll by contacting the school's enrollment staff. If you are the parent/guardian of a student new to the district and enrolling for the very first time in SDUSD, you can enroll your child online in your neighborhood school. IMMUNIZATIONS


California Health Laws require that all students under age 18 years, pre-kindergarten through grade 12, be immunized against certain diseases unless they are exempt for medical reasons. At the time of registration, the school is required to have proof that your child has received all currently due immunizations. In order to enroll in SDUSD schools, children entering kindergarten through 12th grade must have the following vaccinations to enroll:

- Four Polio vaccinations – three doses meet the requirement if at least one was given on or after the 4th birthday
- Five DTaP (Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Pertussis) vaccinations – four doses meet the requirement if at least one was given on or after the 4th birthday; three doses meet the requirement if at least one was given on or after the 7th birthday
- Three Hepatitis B vaccinations
- Two MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella) vaccinations
- Two Varicella vaccinations
- Children entering grades 7-12 must have:
 - » All of the above
 - » 1 Tdap (Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Pertussis) booster shot given on or after the 7th birthday



Parents must show their child's Immunization Record as proof of immunization. Students of all grade levels (TK-12) transferring to a new school need to meet all age-appropriate immunization requirements.





LIBRARIES









RELOCATING TO SAN DIEGO

Moving can be an exciting experience. It is also ranked among life's most stressful events. Whether you are relocating across town or across the country, with the proper planning and preparation, your move can be smooth. Local real estate agents can also be of invaluable assistance.



SIX WEEKS BEFORE THE MOVE

- Take an objective look at what you own and decide what must go and what can be left behind.
- Contact moving companies for estimates. Be aware the cost and ask them what they will do to make your move as smooth as possible.
- Get an estimate from your mover on the cost of letting the company professionally pack all or part of your belongings; the time and effort you save may be worth the cost.
- Organize a garage sale if you have a lot of things worth selling.
- If you have decided to let your mover pack for you, separate what you want to keep from what you plan to sell, give away, and/or throw away.
- Contact your real estate agent, chamber of commerce, and visitor's bureau of the city you are moving to within the valley for information on schools, parks, maps, etc. If you would like to see even more details, please contact your agent and ask for a Ticor Title Buyer/Seller guide.
- Create a central file for all of the details of your move. Keep receipts for moving expenses; they may be tax-deductible.
- Create a floor plan of your new home and think about where you may want to place the furniture. Label specific pieces of furniture on your diagram and place the plan in your moving folder.

FIVE WEEKS BEFORE THE MOVE


- Select your mover and meet to discuss dates and costs.
- If you decide to pack by yourself, you will need to gather boxes.
- Your mover can provide boxes designed for moving, including special containers for clothing on hangers, lamp shades, mirrors, etc.



FOUR WEEKS BEFORE THE MOVE

- Notify the post office, magazines, credit card companies, friends, and family of your change of address. The US Postal Service offers a kit to make this process easier. You can obtain a change of address kit online at www.usps.com.
- Contact utility companies to schedule the start of your services at the new destination for the day before you arrive. Make sure to also schedule the disconnection of your current services for the day after you move.
- If you plan to move large appliances, ask your mover to schedule disconnection and servicing a few days before the move.
- If packing by yourself, begin with seldom-used items. As you pack, remember to keep each box light enough to be handled by any family member. Heavy items go in small boxes and light items go in larger boxes.
- If you are planning a garage sale, pick a date at least one week before the move and advertise it locally.





MOVING TIPS



THREE WEEKS BEFORE THE MOVE

- Take inventory of your everyday household goods. Decide which items you will discard or store.
- If you are packing by yourself, make sure you are now packing with a sense of urgency and doing so at a quicker pace than before.
 - Do not forget your critical documents, such as driver's licenses, identification cards, birth certificates, social security cards, passports, voter registration cards, and the like.
 - Contact doctors, dentists, and veterinarians for medical records and update your information on their files.
 - Plan food purchases carefully so that you can get rid of all perishables by the time you leave; this could save the hassle of panicking to clean a full, dirty refrigerator and freezer at the last moment. It also avoids wasting valuable food and drinks.
- Arrange to have your home professionally cleaned.
- If applicable, contact your children's schools and arrange for records to be forwarded to the new schools.
- Go to your bank and change all necessary information on your accounts. If applicable, this is also a good time to make new safe deposit box arrangements.



TWO WEEKS BEFORE THE MOVE

- Contact insurance companies to cancel policies or arrange to change your address on file.
- If applicable, make arrangements for transporting pets and plants.
- Arrange to transfer the address on file with your pharmacy.
- Cancel delivery services or arrange to change the address on file.
- Service your vehicles.
- Empty any hiding places, remove valuables, and remove or destroy spare house keys.

ONE WEEK BEFORE THE MOVE

- Mow your lawn for the last time.
- Dispose of toxic or flammable items that cannot be moved. Drain fluids from gas-powered tools and appliances.
- Pack your "trip kit" with necessary items that you want to go in your car and not the moving van.
- Plan to take important papers, jewelry, cherished family photos, mementos, and files with you. If you have young children, make arrangements for a babysitter on moving day. Also, arrange for a babysitter to be available when you arrive at your new home.
- Pack most of your clothes as desired.
- Pay outstanding bills and put your new address on any receipts.
- Remove fixtures you are taking with you and replace anything that needs to be replaced.

ONE TO TWO DAYS BEFORE THE MOVE


- Finish emptying and defrosting the freezer and refrigerator.
- Finalize the payment arrangements to the moving company.
- If you are selling your property, leave a forwarding address and phone number for the buyers of the house you are selling.
- If your old house will be sitting vacant, notify police and neighbors.



MOVING DAY

- Remove linens from the beds and pack in an "open first" box.
- Review every single detail and paperwork with the movers when they arrive.
- Double-check with the professional cleaning service and make sure they are still coming over tomorrow to clean the property and finalize payment arrangements with them.



DRIVER'S LICENSE AND VEHICLE REGISTRATION



To get a California driver's license, you must relinquish your out-of-state license, take a vision exam, pass the knowledge test(s), and pay a fee. Most California IDs are valid for 5 years. You must register any out-of-state vehicle within twenty days of permanent residency. Personal property tax is included in your registration fees.

To register your car, you will need to submit the following to the DMV:

- A Completed Application for Title or Registration (Form REG 343)
- The Vehicle's Out-of-State Title
- The Vehicle's Out-of-State Registration
- Proof of Insurance
- A Valid Smog Certificate
- Applicable registration, transfer, and use tax fees.

Smog Tests


California has one of the country's strictest smog control ordinances. Vehicles manufactured between 1965 and 1979 generally require the installation of a smog device. Smog certificates stating that your car's pollution control device works properly must be presented to the DMV at the time of registration. Cars must be examined for compliance at state-approved garages and facilities.

Insurance Information

Automobile insurance is compulsory in California. You must provide at least the following coverage:

- **Bodily injury liability coverage:** \$15,000 per person / \$30,000 per accident minimum.
- **Property damage liability coverage:** \$5,000 minimum.
- **Uninsured motorist bodily injury coverage:** \$15,000 per person / \$30,000 per accident minimum.

Voter Registration

To register to vote in California, you must:

- be a United States citizen
- be a resident of California
- be at least 18 years old or older on Election Day
- not be currently serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony
- not be currently found to be mentally incompetent to vote by a court

California offers online voter registration: registertovote.ca.gov. To register online, you will need a California-issued driver's license or California identification card number, the last four digits of your social security number, and consent to the use of your DMV-stored digital signature to use California's online voter registration system. If you don't have a California-issued ID or don't want to provide consent for the use of your digital signature, you can still register by mail to vote.



Voting

In California, you have the following voting options:

- **Vote in Person on Election Day:** If you already registered to vote online or through the mail, you can go to your polling place day of to vote.
- **Early Voting:** Any registered voter may vote using a vote-by-mail ballot instead of going to the polls on Election Day. Vote-by-mail ballots that are mailed must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by your county elections office no later than 7 days after Election Day. If you are not sure your vote-by-mail ballot will arrive in time if mailed, bring it to any polling place in the state between 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.
- **Same Day Voter Registration:** Voters can conditionally register and vote after the 15-day voter registration deadline at your polling place.
- **Ballot Drop-Off:** A secured box where vote-by-mail ballots may be dropped off.
